A surprise was in store for Brigden Fair when we were awarded the 2019 Fair of the Year by World's Finest Shows!








Well March started off with a great Quarter Auction supporting some

# Corona Virus Rocked Our World as we know it!

But at that point we had not panicked!

As you all know, workplaces were closed and all events were postponed or cancelled. Times were changing......

The **Beef Dinner** had been cancelled until Further Notice and individuals were asked to hold on to their tickets. Ticket Sellers were to drop off their money at the fair office Mail Slot. Nancy was not in the office and Rachel was looking after our financial needs remotely. A decision would be made at a later date when the dinner would be rescheduled to.

Prior to the Virus taking hold of our plans, the Homecraft Division purchased new chairs and chair racks for the Exhibition Hall. They are much more comfortable, easier to handle and we looked forward to when we could debut them. A team came together of Peter & Cheryl McGuire, Jack Font, Bruce Brown, Malcolm Rogers, Ross Pettit and Michelle Evanitski to dismantle any of the chairs that were broken and dispose of the unusable pieces.

Bookings including the two brunches, two banquets, Air Stream Campout, Ladies Night Quarter Auction were cancelled. Some weddings and banquets were still in a "wait and see" mode and we were keeping in contact with them.

**Storage Removal** went well with renters booking appointment times to pick up their items and social distancing being maintained.

**4-H Ontario** went online! During this time, they were not able to participate in club activities as they normally would have but that didn't mean they couldn't get the 4-H experience from home! Youth could continue to obtain project completion credits through provincial online explore 4-H projects but also through virtual clubs in their association.

**The Beacon** went digital so readers were required to go to the St. Clair Township webpage for upcoming events and cancellations.

Planning for the **Bluegrass and Country Jamboree Weekend** was still in place awaiting to see what the Province and the safety of our volunteers and patrons will allow.

Children's Safety Village – As you all remember, we had a number of membership meetings concerning the Lambton Children's Safety Village being built at the Brigden Fairgrounds. We regret to let the membership know that the Safety Village committee had advised us that they would be closing their doors. They felt that with the new regulations about the virus, it would be impossible for them to go further. As Mary Ann Buntrock stated, "we are going to be living in a different world and one that the priority of people will be changing. All avenues will be difficult for us from social distancing, busing and fundraising – all these we cannot do. Schools will be run different too and it will take time to make these changes." The decision was very hard for the committee and they thanked Moore Agricultural Society for our support. They would like to continue to be a part of the Brigden Fair Family.

Moore Agricultural Society also thanked them for all their work in trying to bring the project to fruition but understand the difficulties at this time.

#### **Additional Updates**

Although things have slowed down at the fairgrounds and meetings have been cancelled, Presidents Malcolm and Michelle had been busy lobbying our government representatives including MP Marilyn

Gladu, MPP Bob Bailey, Minister of Agriculture Ernie Hardeman, and Senator Rob Black on how lost revenues will be disastrous for the future of agricultural societies. They have been working with CAFÉ (Canadian Association of Fairs and Exhibitions) and OAAS (Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies), completing surveys and providing financial projections. If you have been following the financial programs being provided by the Federal and Provincial Governments, many ag societies (especially those who own their own property) are not eligible. The Presidents are questioning whether grants will be available to supplement these lost revenues. Brigden Fair is very fortunate that we were able to postpone some maintenance projects that had been planned for 2020 but there are many fairboards across the province that are fearful of the future.

Major decisions have not been made at this time and we continue to hope that the virus curve will be flattened and life will return to a "somewhat" familiar place. We have continued to apply for grants.... Just in case!


Discussions with St. Clair Township were productive regarding the Harvest of Gold Draw that had been planned for 2020. Since no tickets had been sold, the Lottery Co-ordinator was willing to hold the licence to be changed for the 2021 draw.

A loader tractor had been purchased prior to the shutdown and became very useful during many of the projects that would be undertaken over the summer (including Rock Picking!).

Government Programs including CERB and Wage Subsidy were applied for to assist our employees.

The Creative County Grant that was received for a 2020 project was extended until Fair 2021.

The Homecraft Executive continued to meet in a socially distanced manner and it was decided that we would be unable to operate Fair Kitchen 2020 if the fair would take place. Lengthy discussions took plate debating the pros and cons of how we could keep all the volunteers, exhibitors and patrons safe prior, during and post fair activities.

It is with sincere regret that the Moore Agricultural Society is announcin the postponement of the 2020 Brigden Fall Fair to the £all of 2021.

Each year over the Thanksgiving Weekend our fairgrounds, as well as the small community in which we reside, welcomes upwards of fifty thousand people to our four day celebration of agriculture. Unfortunately as a result of the ongoing global pandemic, the Moore Agricultural Society does not feel that an event such as the Brigden Fair can be successfully held without compromising the safety of the volunteers, exhibitors, staff, judges, vendors, sponsors, community, and patrons that are relied upon. Enhancement of both rural and urban life is central to the mission of the Moore Agricultural Society, and because of the way this year has progressed, the possible benefits of moving forward with the fair are outweighed by the risks involved.

In addition to the individual health risks, the financial considerations of moving forward with the Brigden Fair have weighed heavily on the minds of the organizers. The operation of the Moore Agricultural Society largely relies on donations provided through the generosity of local individuals and businesses. We recognize that many, if not all of our sponsors have been hit hard over the past few months by the economic repercussions of the ongoing global pandemic. The Moore Agricultural Society refuses to let the 1.70th Brigden Fall Fair become a financial burden to our sponsors and to the community that supports us.

However, make no mistake, the seriousness of the decision to postpone the fair is not taken for granted. Please monitor the official Brigden Fair website (WWW.BRIGDENFAIR.CA) along with its various social media accounts for news regarding any ongoing activities that we may be able to host once restrictions are adjusted. We recognize that the Brigden Fair has far I reaching social and economic impacts, and in the coming months we will do our best to mitigate the losses felt across the community.

The Moore Agricultural Society membership will take this time to complete projects around our property and work with our committees (while social distancing), to come back stronger and even more creative next year.

Please continue to work on your exhibits using the theme "Hats Off to Brigden Fair", hone your prize winning recipes and plan for a time when we can all meet again and truly give "thanks" that together we have endured.

With the fair being cancelled for 2020, how were we going to fundraise when we needed to social distance??????

CAFÉ – Canadian Association of Fairs and Events started a Progressive online 50/50 Draw. Patrons played \$2 every week. Once you purchased numbers, they were yours but if you did not pay your \$2, and your ticket was pulled, the winnings would go into the next week's jackpot!

This was a good fundraiser for the Moore Agricultural Society as the breakdown of the pool was as follows:

50% of the weekly draw went to the winner

10% of the weekly draw went to the administration

40% of your ticket price went to the organization you supported. Therefore for every \$2 ticket registered to Brigden Fair, the society received \$.80.

#### **Homecraft Quilt Raffle Tickets**

Typically the majority of Homecraft Quilt Tickets are sold at events such as Jamborees, Brunches, Moore Craft Show and the Fair but with Covid Restrictions in place, concerns arose as to how to promote the draw. Again we are thankful that due to the unusual COVID 19 pandemic, St. Clair Township was willing to make amendments to the Lottery license and to delay the draw date until Thanksgiving Monday, October 2021

We appreciate the support of everyone who purchases or sells quilt tickets and we now have a new way that you can purchase quilt tickets!!!!

You can still contact any member of the Moore Agricultural Society Homecraft Division or you can purchase through etransfer!

Simply email quiltraffle@brigdenfair.ca with how many tickets you wish to purchase, including names and contact information for the tickets.

Once email is received you will receive further instructions and your ticket numbers will be forwarded to you.

Tickets are \$2 each or 3/\$5 but you can purchase in higher increments. Don't be left out. The quilt is Queen Size and handmade by our members.





During July, MAS started working on Government CEBA grants that in hindsight proved more difficult to complete than first assumed. This Federal program was to ensure small businesses have access to the capital they need to see them through the current challenges and better position them to quickly return to providing services to their communities and creating or maintaining employment.

#### **2001 OAAS Convention**



Thanksgiving Pie Fundraiser – The ladies are working on a Thanksgiving Pie Sale with pre-orders and pre-payment. They would take orders from Sept 1 until Sept 15. Order forms were sent to MAS members. Choices were: Apple, Cherry, Blueberry (Frozen – ready to bake); Pecan, Pumpkin – Ready to serve; Pkgs of 5 frozen pie crusts (Ready to Bake). Pick up dates would be Thanksgiving Friday/Saturday with sign up times (COVID). Prior to the fundraiser being put in place, Jenna Armitage of the Health Unit was contacted regarding the annual kitchen inspection, social distancing, cleaning practices and contact tracing. #### "HARVEST OF GOLD"

And the Winner is..... What Happened?

A Brigden Fair lottery that saw its jackpot climb to more than \$70,000 was stopped in its tracks and forced to draw a winner Thursday night (prior to the scheduled Dec 1 draw date).

Moore Agricultural Society President Malcolm Rogers said all lotteries using The Lotto Factory fundraising platform in Ontario, including their Harvest of Gold 50/50 draw, were shut down.

"This action was taken by the organizing group who were having the validity of their license in Ontario challenged by the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario," said Rogers. The Lotto Factory Global, which runs lottery websites on behalf of fundraisers, claims its Interactive Gaming License was granted from a Quebec-based gaming commission, from the Mohawk Territory of Kahnawake.

Rogers said the Glencoe Fair, which saw its 50/50 draw reach an unprecedented \$366,806 this fall, used the same platform. "There were numerous groups. Glencoe is the one that's known, after all that took place, it was quite large. Other groups, like ourselves, fairs and different organizations, jumped on board to try and use it [the software] to raise funds because we didn't have a fair. So, this was going to be a great way to generate some revenues to be able to ensure our fairs would go next year."

Rogers said thankfully a winning ticket in their lottery was still drawn.

"On a more positive note, out there somewhere, is an individual named Amanda, who is \$35,270 richer this morning." Rogers said the individual, whose last name wasn't revealed, will be notified by email by The Lotto Factory. In previous years, when the fair only sold paper tickets, about \$5,000 was raised with the winner claiming \$2,500.
